This limited amount of time has seen cross border collaborations with a number of groups from Shankill, Belfast, collaborations with lead Smart D8 Forum members leading to an arrangement that The Liberties Community Project host a Community Health Coordinator position and the ongoing growth of our core charitable programmes. 2025 has also seen further engagement in strategic research, advocacy and fundraising projects that are expected to bear fruit later in 2025.

None, or certainly not all, of these things would have been possible for either smaller forbearer of The Liberties Community Project and I hope that my colleagues, our supporters and the community we serve share the view that we are truly 'Better Together' as a merged entity. Meet the Team: Olena Ponomarenko

My name is Olena, and I'm the Integration Manager at The Liberties Community Project. I work with migrants and refugees, helping them integrate into the local community and find employment. This includes organising English classes, job readiness workshops, and self-employment sessions. I also oversee the Open Kitchen programme, which gives people without access to a kitchen the chance to cook, share their culture, and connect with others.

The most rewarding part of my work is seeing people grow in confidence and independence. One story that stands out is of a refugee who struggled with English and job hunting. After attending our workshops, he found a job and later returned as a volunteer, eager to give back. Moments like these remind me of the power of community support.

I've learned that even small acts of kindness can change someone's life. The Liberties Community Project is a place where people uplift and support each other, and I feel lucky to be part of it. If we had a theme song, it would be Lean on Me by Bill Withers—because here, no one has to stand alone.



Advocacy Training

The Liberties Community Project in conjunction with Community Law and mediation (CLM) will deliver a series of training sessions designed for community organisations, residents associations and individual engaged in advocacy projects around environmental and housing justice in Q2 2025.
